

Employment

Unemployment rate for Chattanooga was 3.7% which is less than nation unemployment rate, 5.3%, as of August 2021.

Education

The number of population 25 years and over attains bachelor's degree or higher in 2020 was 38,570, and the number is increased to 42,968 in 2021.

2021 Community Survey Report's Highlights:

- Public Safety residents' overall satisfaction with police, fire, emergency medical services, and 911 remain positive in 2021.
- **Public Works** resident satisfaction is positive overall in 2021. However, ratings of satisfaction are trending down over the past five years.
- Transportation residents continue to be less enthusiastic about transportation related issues.
- Parks and Recreation residents continue to rate positively.
- Economic business owners continue to indicate Chattanooga is a good place to do business.







WHAT CHANGED?



REVENUES

Charges for service was yet again where we received the majority of our revenue. The increase in total revenue this year can be attributed to capital and operating grants from the federal and state government. The increase in revenue helped offset the decline in investment income.

EXPENSES

We continued to have Public Safety as our highest expense this year in efforts to keep our people safe. There were further increases in Economic and Community Developments and General Government expenses. This was offset by deductions in the public works department and business-type activities.

NET POSITION

The city's net position for FY 2021 is \$2,425,136 which was an increase from the prior year due to a rise in total assets. This year our city saw higher revenues and lower expenses, a trend we seek to continue.

SOUTH BROAD REVITALIZATION







The City of Chattanooga is in the process of revitalizing the Western gateway into the Scenic City. For almost two decades the historic monument, yet dilapidated Wheland Foundry & U.S. Pipe Site have sat vacant and now are being redeveloped and restored. The City, County, and State have come together for the South Broad Revitalization Project. This will be a multi-year project, beginning with a multi-use Stadium that will be home to The Chattanooga Lookouts Minor League Baseball Team. They have pledged one of the largest annual rents in all of minor league ball at \$1 million while only accounting for 20% of events at the site.

This project will generate jobs, multi-family housing, retail, green spaces, tourism, higher quality of life, and huge economic return to the area. The total investments will exceed \$1 Billion, while Phase 1 alone will take \$300 Million of that. This historic investment will yield a return that will benefit the entire region for generations. The project is expected to generate at least \$40 million in additional education funding for Hamilton County over the next 30 years. This will be done without raising taxes. We also plan to keep our goal in mind for Funding Priorities for 2020-2024 as well as our City goals and development needs.

CHATTANOOGA NEIGHBORHOOD ENTERPRISE

- Down payment assistance/loans
- Financial coaching and homebuyer education
- Real estate development CNE develops single-family for-sale housing and multi-family mixed income rental housing in Chattanooga
- Property management provides property management services for the rental portfolio. Currently 170 units. 76 under construction. 82 in predevelopment

NEW INDUSTRY COMING INTO THE COMMUNITY

- Volkswagen announced another \$800 million expansion to the plant facility for the production of an electric vehicle, expected to go on sale in 2022.
- ATN Hoelzel LP, a supplier to VW, will move its manufacturing facility and relocate North American headquarters to Chattanooga.
- Nippon Paint began construction on a factory in East Chattanooga.
- Gestamp, a supplier to VW, BMV, and Mercedes-Benz announced plan for a \$94 million expansion.
